History . . . "This is Real!"

The little girl from St. Louis walked slowly around the basement of the 16th Street Baptist Church in Birmingham, Alabama, viewing the pictures that were posted in memory of the four little girls killed in the bombing of their church. One of the girls was "about my age" she thought. Confusion and sadness clearly marking her face, she asked her mother, "Why did the men do that, mama? She died for no reason. I'm glad I'm living now 'cause I don't know if I'd be alive if I lived back then." For this little girl, history had become real.

It was August 2, 2014, more than 50 years after the Birmingham Bombing that killed four little girls, sparked riots and launched national protests and movements against a racism that is deeply woven into the American fabric.

The trip to Birmingham was the annual trip sponsored by CWAH for underserved families to cities that are rich in African American history. Perhaps the separation in time provided a sense of safety for the little girl from St. Louis.


Who would have imagined, one week later, August 9, 2014 history would be made real much closer to home, as a young black teenager was shot and killed by a policeman in nearby Ferguson, MO, once again sparking riots and protests that continue to this day. We can only wonder how safe the little girl feels today.

Dr. Patrice Johnson, CWAH board member and a former client of the organization, accompanied the 21 children and adults making the trip to Birmingham this summer. She observed the interaction between mother and daughter in the basement of the church that receives over 80,000 visitors annually. Herself a teacher, parent, missionary and a woman who's "been through it", Dr. Johnson spoke candidly about spin, perspective and personal truth.

"The cultural trips are invaluable," she says, "they provide first-hand experiences to our families and an opportunity to walk through time and come back to the realities of today, almost like a time capsule. With today's children, for whom black history is just another story in a book, this is not a text or a tweet . . . this is real!"

Dr. Johnson emphasized the importance of objectivity and the need for each of us to recognize how perspective and spin changes the way situations are presented. Removing the sometimes-heavy veil of money-driven corporate media and the personal biases that we all hold, requires us to take a step back and evaluate what our personal truths say is real. The continuum of demonstrated racism through the years can disgust and discourage. Spin can carry a subtle message of hopelessness and futility. But Dr. Johnson's journey through life stands as a testament to what we can accomplish.

With the help of organizations like CWAH, Dr. Johnson has taken her life to a higher level, where service and giving back are paramount. From the victimization of domestic abuse to a Doctorate in Educational Leadership Administration, this woman whose dazzling smile transforms those around her now has her sights set on moving to northwestern U.S. Her journey is taking her outside St. Louis and outside education to ministry and mission, working with the homeless and addressing teenage suicide. When asked what role CWAH played in this incredible journey, she said, "I will always be connected to CWAH, working with them will always be a pleasure, and I will always be there . . . whenever they need me." 
